This is a question that has been asked many, many times over the past 100 years. In the beginning, before there was an M.G. automobile, there was a car manufacturer based in Oxford, England, named Morris Motors, and he had a garage that sold and serviced his cars; e.g. "Morris Garages." When the first M.G. car came along in 1923, it was fittingly named the "M.G." As the years passed and the marque became more numerous and famous due to its successes in competitions in the U.K. and abroad, the name was shortened to simply "MG." Jean Kimber Cook, daughter of Cecil Kimber, the founder of MG, once asked her father, "What does MG stand for?" Kimber answered, "It just stands for itself." So there you have it, MG simply stands for itself.
